BITS Hyperloop takes off

The newly formed BITS Hyperloop team was one of the 100 teams that were selected to present their design at the SpaceX Design Weekend in Texas in January. Described as a “cross between a concorde, an air hockey table and a railgun”, the Hyperloop is a metal capsule that will be propelled, while levitating on an air cushion, down a long metal tube at the speed of sound, in partial vacuum. It was suggested as a means of transport by Elon Musk, founder of SpaceX which has challenged universities all over the world to design Hyperloop pods. “We’ve managed to strike up collaborations with a lot of top teams like the MIT team,” informs Sibesh Kar, leader of BITS Hyperloop. The team is off to a great start and plans to expand by adding other campuses to the fray, since no university in India has enough resources to build the Hyperloop on its own. It is also a multi-disciplinary challenge; expertise from various fields is required. Needless to say, the Hyperloop and Musk enthusiasts on campus are bound to see exciting and bold steps in this field pretty soon.

Second Phase of Construction

Keeping up with the undergoing Project Parivartan in the Pilani campus, BITS Pilani - Hyderabad Campus has also embarked upon a major expansion of facilities in lieu of increasing student strength. The foundation stone for the second phase of construction was laid by the IT Minister of Telangana, K. T. Rama Rao. Phase II is expected to be completed by 2018 and includes the construction of a New Academic Block, a thousand-seat capacity open air theatre, four new hostel *bhavans* and expansion of sports facilities.

Mana Mali: The Gardener Of The Mind

Think back to a time in your life when you felt stressed, anxious and overwhelmed, as if an elephant was sitting on your chest; and you didn’t know who to approach. “Does this lead you to a memory from your university days?” asks 24-year-old NRI, Nitya Kanuri, who graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. She is the brain behind Mana Maali, a project funded by Stanford, BITS Hyderabad, VNR, and other private donors, which essentially provides students with mental health support through applications they can access online and on their phones. The main benefit is that students can get help anonymously and privately on their own time and on platforms they are already comfortable with. After a well-received launch at the Hyderabad campus of BITS in early 2015, the project is being extended to the Pilani, Goa campuses as well. The Application used by Mana Maali is called ‘Lantern’, and offers structured, 10-minute modules that asks users about their mood and stress levels, and accordingly recommends specific techniques to help them.

New scholarship opportunities

The recent formulation of the International Programmes and Collaboration Division (IPCD) has been a conscious step towards designing suitable aspects of Study-Abroad and Study-in-India programmes for students. IPCD has established several MoUs with various foreign industrial institutions and universities which would facilitate internships or Semester Abroad programmes. The scholarship offers partial funding for select applicants who wish to pursue their thesis in an international university. To supplement the Merit-cum-Need Scholarship offered by the Student Welfare Division (SWD) and reconcile the multiplying needs of students, the Laundromat has also taken the decision to provide the SWD with a scholarship fund of 1,00,000 INR per annum. The introduction of such initiatives promises to act as a gateway to providing a thorough platform for student learning.

Melange 2016 - A Thespian Treat

It was a delectation for the theatre lover as the second edition of Melange, the three-day theatre festival took place on 5th through 7th February. The first day featured a melodious narration of a section of the Mahabharata by The Manganiyar Seduction - a group of Rajasthani folk artists. The novel stage setup was worthy of mention.
