- The <u>Doris Duke Conservation Scholars Program</u> at the University of Michigan (DDCSP UM) is a two-summer program for <u>undergraduate students</u> from diverse backgrounds. This program infuses diversity, equity, and inclusion into intensive research and internship experience focusing on conservation in southeast Michigan and the Great Lakes Region.
